Comment [U4]: Flow and rhythm – simple, yet effective in allowing the reader to enjoy reading this poem & focus on the message

Comment [U5]: Juxtaposition between two stanzas – previous negative images, contrasted with 'brave and fine' – again, symbolic of coloured line, the different scenarios faced by black and white.

Comment [U6]: Hopeful tone or protective – mother protecting her son from the harsh realities of the world as a coloured person.
